Bethany High School was built in 1916. The gymnasium was added on in 1938. The final addition to the school was the Junior High Wing. It was built in 1962.


Imagine What Could Be...




Editorial



































Track Team Grows Larger





























The Year In Review Around the World



In April, 1995, Kansas Senator Bob Dole announced his candidacy for President. At age 73, Dole would be the oldest newly elected president in history.

The "trial of the century" came to an end on Oct. 3,1995, when O.J. Simpson was aquitted for the June 12, 1994 stabbing of his ex-wife and her friend. The jury deliberated for less than four hours after 133 days of testimony.

President Clinton entered the third year of his term with a Republican Congress, the first president to do so in 40 years. He began to focus on his re-election bid in the fall of '95.




On Sept. 5, 1995, during her first visit to China, Hillary Clinton delivered a powerful speech to the UN's World Conference on Women.




