Señora Blackford







Reality hit home the morning of Sept. 29 as BHS students discovered what was hidden beneath two oddly shaped tarps positioned curiously on the football field. Students and teachers were about to witness a simulation of the events that occur immediately following car accident.

As the tarps were removed, a loud scream was heard, followed by hysterical cries for help. A passenger in the back seat of one car continuously rambles, as another lay dead on the hood of the car and still another sits quietly in shock. The drunken driver, seemingly unhurt, stumbles around the vehicle unscathed by what he has done.

From the second car emerges the driver, shaken, but in control. He yells for his wife and his children, one of which lies dead a few yards from the car. Police cars arrive within moments and survey the scene. The officers begin their task of checking for survivors as the fire/rescue trucks and ambulances arrive. Quickly the rescue team devotes their attention to the survivors.

A back seat passenger has to be cut out of one vehicle, while others are carefully removed and transported on back boards to ambulances. The coroner places a dead body in the hearse, while the drunken driver fails a sobriety test and is put in hand cuffs.

The scene was tragic. Everything from the make up and hand cuffs to the screaming and radio calls was recreated as life like as possible. Many have never experienced an accident of this caliber and now, after having seen the results, hopefully everyone will think twice as they get into a car. **Below**:SADD members, Betsy Rowe and April Harris have a little R&R after the crash simulation.




















H HOMECOMING~ Spirit Week & Assembly


The Senior Class Trip of 1999 was a success! A total of sixteen seniors left on Friday, May 24 and headed to Tantara Resort in Missouri.


